


Vendetta

Continuing this vendetta against Herbert it is not surprising that with two acquittals Bradshaw panicked. The fear that Herbert might be set free and his cause vindicated sent Bradshaw rushing to the Legislature pushing his Minister without Portfolio ahead of him. Those of us who know the misister and who know the relationship between he and R. L. B. are not surprised at this.

I fear there is vorse to come in St. Kitts: This small island with no pasture land found it convenient recently to produce electric cattle probes to use on people. 
