**M**R. DENNIS RICHARDSON, an Anguillan who has resided in St. Kitts for over ten years, was ordered by Premier Robert Bradshaw to leave St. Kitts on Monday afternoon this week.

Dennis who came to St. Kitts in June 1958, was an employee of Messrs. S. L. Horsford & Co. for a number of years.

## Fire destroys Clarke's home

A disastrous fire completely destroyed the home of Mr. Noel Clarke of Burdon Street, Basseterre, on Monday morning this week. Mr. Clarke lost everything.

Mrs. Clarke told our reporter that at about 9.30 a.m. she was in one of the southern rooms of the house cleaning her sewing machine, when she heard one of the neighbours shout,

She got up at the alarm only to discover that two of the rooms to the north were ablaze. All she was able to do at that stage, she said, was to grab a small child which was in the house with her, turn off the main switch for the electricity and dash out of the house to safety.

By this time several neighbours had already telephoned for the Fire Brigade which arrived on the scene when the entire property had already been destroyed.

The Fire Brigade however was able to save

the home of Mrs. Swanston, which is immediately north of Mr. Clarke's. This house is badly burnt on the south side. Mrs. Swanston, an elderly lady, collapsed while the fire was in progress, but was later revived.

Mr. Clarke who was at work, arrived on the scene to witness the entire property engulfed in flames. He was treated at the Cunningham Hospital for shock and later released.

Bogota, Feb. 13 — Four British Royal Navy ships will visit Colombia from Feb. 20 to 25 to take part with Colombian vessels in a naval exercise in the Caribbean, it was announced here today.

The frigate Juno, the destroyer Decoy, the submarine Walrus and the tanker Orangeleaf are expected to visit the ports of Barranquilla and Cartagena, the announcement said.

The ships last week took part in a similar exercise with ships of the Venezuelan Navy.
