## BRITAIN DENES ANGUILLA CHARGE

LONDON AP) - The British government has denied a charge by Anguillan leader Ronald Webster that it went back on an agreement made between Webster and Britain's Lord Caradon.

Speaking in Puerto Rico on his way to New York, Webster said the new British Commissioner on Anguilla, Anthony Lee, had dissolved a seven-man council and declared martial law.

The Foreign Office in London said yesterday nothing has been done that did not adhere to the plans worked out by Webster and Lord Caradon. The seven-man council of islanders had been dissolved by Lee, but under the new agreement all of the council members were re-instated

The Foreign Office also denied that British Army Engineers on Anguilla were occupation troops.

It said the men are making improvements on the island and training islanders to take over after they leave.
Webster is expected to work out the problems at meet-
ings with Lord Caradon in New York this week.
