There is nothing that the people of Anguilla or her leaders can do about it. Britain maintains that she has nothing to do with the internal matters of these islands; we in Anguilla fee. differently. Her Majest's Government created the State in the mids of confusion and discontent. Whether H.M.G was informed of the true situation in Anguilla before Statehood, we do not know. H.M.G sent Mr Henry Hall and Mr Arthur Bottomley from the C R O to Anguilla, and they apparently reported that the opposition here was negligible, and it was on their advice

that Statehood was implemented, and so confusion started. The arrival of H.M.S Salisbury is further proof that the Anguillans were protesting. We gather that these two gentlemen who gave a false report have already been removed from their positions, but that does not relieve H.M.G of her ultimate responsibility. The people of Anguilla protested then, to no avail: today we send Mr Webster with the full mandate of his people to ask for the right of self-determination. Wh has Mr Bradshaw or anyone else any right to deny this to us? The people went to the polls, under the supervision of Mr Lee, the British Representative, and elected their Council: Then the Council chose Mr Webster as their chairman, and he is now

in London, speaking for 6,000 people.

Will the wishes of the people be overlooked? Will H.M.G create a similar situation as in Rhodesia or Biafra? Or will. she tell Mr Bradshaw that if the people do not want him, he should not try and impose himself on them. Will H.M. Government now admit that Henry Hall, Arthur Bottomley, and Governor Fred Philips grossly under-estimated or deliberately concealed Anguilla's opposition to Statehood.

We ask H.M.G to admit her mistakes and to seek the help of the Commonwealth Caribbean leaders and deal with the situation now (for delay is dangerous). We ask her to tell Mr Bradshaw and his Government that Anguillans have the right to self-determination, as have any other people in the world.

We have a right to this and are prepared to die for our convictions, rather to exist for another century as third-class

citizens of another country.

Are we asking too much? Are we not asking Britain for the same thing that Bradshaw asked Britain for?. Had he to fight for it, and even if he did, does that give Britain the right to keep us tied to him indefinitely?

We are asking Britain to undo a great wrong which she

did to us, and to make a fresh beginning.



THE LONDON TALKS

Both Mr Webster and Mr Bradshaw were interviewed on their arrival in Britain. Mr Webster's remark that he had come with a firm mandate from the people, and yet with an open mind, appeared inconsistent to the interviewer. Yet, knowing Mr Webster, and his send off from Anguilla, we can say that both statements were true. He was coming with a firm purpose, with a definite goal, but how the goal was to be reached he was approaching with an open mind. He did not leave here to negotiate for a strong local government, or for the return of Anguilla to the fold of St Kitts. We are sure that the news of the presence of the Revd Leonard Carty at the talks will be welcomed, and that this will give strength to our deputation. We are not sure that Mr Bradshaw's choice of his delegates will strengthen his hand.

If we could confront Mr Bradshaw with the entire population of Anguilla saying WE DO NOT WANT YOU, would he still say YOU CAN NOT SECEDE. In his interview he claimed that we were all one nice family with St Kitts. Why does he not come

and pay a visit to his family?

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

A GRAND OLD LADY OF ANGUILLA

Proper feminine reluctance to confess her age obscures her beginnings, but Mr J.B. Owen (Anguilla's beloved 'Uncle Joe') believes that she was born in the last century, probably in Bonaire. She came to Anguilla in 1908, when, already a matron or the sea, she was purchased by Mr Carter Rey from Mr Pearle Gumbs in St Martin.

The big sloop, noted for her trim lines and speed, named the Leocaddie, was re-named the Betsy Ro in honour of Mr Rey's favourite sister, and began many years of work carrying cotton seed to Barbados, and baled cotton from Anguilla's ginnery to an island lying to the S.E of Anguilla, for eventual shipment to England's mills.

But with all her sober industry, the Betsy indulged in feminine skittishness and engaged in escapades that has she been less lucky, might have dubbed her accident-prone. Heavily loaded with cotton seed for Barbados, she met with a heavy squall in the Anguillan channel and drifted on to the rocks in the lee reef. The seed was jettisoned, and dried on the beach while the Betsy was hauled on to the beach at the Forest, cut in two, enlarged and converted into a schooner. Once she broke a in new galvanised chain, and went aground at the Forest with no damage; years later at Lockrum she drifted onto the rocks, but was eased over them back into deep water. Doubtless much of the Betsy's good luck was due to the skill and devotion of her master for many years, the late Captain Hershell Gumbs.who shipped on her as a young boy, and rose to be her skipper for many years till his retirement.

In the strange and unexpected hurricane of Sun: 1st Jan:

1955, Anguillans were walking home from church, enjoying the fresh breeze, which quickly grew to gale force, catching all the vessels unprepared. The Betsy along with the Excelsior dragged anchor and went on the rocks at the Forest. Badly damaged and settled on the rocks, the Betsy was in grave trouble, but Uncle Joe devised an ingenious method of strapping air-tight drums to her hull, and bit by bit she was raised to floating level and beached where she could be repaired. It was the green hard keel from B.G. that saved her. In the well remembered conna in 1960 the Betsy rode out the storm traumphantly at the Forest, the only vessel to survive unscathed. Pulled up at the Road in 1964, whe was completely rebuilt, and given a marine Diesal engine .. all that was left was the model and her name.

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Still fine looking and able, this spry old lady has been resting since active trade with the south east was cut off, and she awaits new tasks to lure her over the many sea miles she has yet to sail. Perhaps some energetic young Anguillan will convert this gallant old girl into a cruise ship, and the Betsy would once again poke her prow into further escapades.
