The news recorded elsewhere in this issue that a very influential body has been set up under the Chairman of Lord Lambton in London, called the Friends of Anguilla, reminds us that in the last eighteen months we ha collected possibly a larger number of friends in the M.S.A, in Puerto Rico in Britain and elsewhere, than there are adult Anguillans in Anguilla. Also a leading article in the Times of London this week, urging that H.M.G should do something at once for Anguilla is very heatening. This should make us all think again and question the wisdom of any immediate declaration of independence. Apart from this new interest by outsiders in the affairs of Anguilla, have we really consulted the three experts who advises Anguilla, as to what our next action should be? The solution of the Anguilla problem is a matter for experts, a matter of high diplomacy, of playing the right card at the right time, and any ill-advised action taken by Anguilla now, might antagonise Her Majesty's Government, embarass our friends in the Caribbean, and bring the world opinion against us, and so turn our good charces of victory to defeat.

The three experts who advises Anguilla are, Professor Roger Fisher an exp. ert on International Law, who is coming to anguilla for Christmas. Is he to be greeted on arival with news that Anguilla has already decided on a definite course of action? Mr. Hudson Philipps, our own lawyer at the London talks, is coming to Anguilla this week, he could tell us what the reactions to a sudden declaration of independence might be in the Caribbean. Mr. Tony Lee, the representative of the British Government on this island, can be trusted as a true friend of Anguilla, and he would hate to see us make false step at this juncture. News that Anguilla is going to take action soon after January 8th. is widespread. Apparently such decision has been taken without the consultation and the advice of these experts.

We call upon the council of the Island to wait and hear what these experts

say, before coming to any decision. If they agree in their advice, it would be madness for us to disregard it. Any unwise action at this juncture by Anguilla would also be a slap in the face to her many friends. Amputationis a very serious operation, only to be taken at the last resort if all other methods of saving the limb should have failed. A skilled surgeon only takes such a step when he knows that all other means have been tried.

The BEACON does not lay claim to any skill in diplomacy, but we will be surprised if the opinion of our three experts does not agree with some of our recent editorials which advised Anguilla to WAIT. Let some one else take the next step. The declaration of unilateral independence is much more powerful as a threat, than it could work out in practice.

DENTAL NEWS. Dr. Jerry McKimmy, from Castaner, Puerto Rico, will be working in the Valley dental Clinic this week. He will give first attention to those people who have already had x-rays and a preliminary examination, Emergency cases of pain will be, of course, taken care of also, but we hope many will go to the clinic and make appointments for x-rays and examinations so that when the next dentist comes treatment can be made quickly.



STREET LIGHTS Doubtful For Christmas.

As THE Christmas season draws near, every one may be wondering what is happening to the promised street lights for the Valley, but the situation is this reported Mr. Emtage of Emtage Electric of Barbados, the contractor for the Ice and Cold Store Plant at the Valley. All the poles ordered for the project were delayed because of shipping cansellations out of Guyana. Then the wrong wire was shipped out of Barbados which had to be returned. Then a gleam of hope came when the poles, fixtures and wire were ready in Barbados, for shippment to Anguilla. All this material was loaded on the Ruth 16, which should arrive here this weekend. According to Mr. Emtage, if the boat arrives as planned, there might be some hope of some street lights being installed. At any event, he said, there will be lights on the Park in the Valley. Mr. Emtage added, that the Ice and Cold Store Plant will be in full operation next week. Both generators were already started up, and the plant being tested. The two 55 KVA diesel generators will supply continuos power to the plant and street lights for the Valley, with power to most Government Buildings, and the Churches in the area.Mr. Emtage said, that the Ice Plant will turn out 1 ton of ice per day, with room to store up to 5 tons. Crushed ice will also be availlable from the plant.

Medical Officer Dr. Felix Spector has just completed a series of talksat the Road, West End and East End Schools, and at the Community Centre. These talks were for the purpose of explaining about tuberculosis, a disease with a long history among all the Caribbean Islands. Under the present Government it is now possible for the first time to begin the eradication of this otherwise dangerous illness. Plans are being made for an island-wide campaign of skin testing, with the help of one of the foremost medical laboratories in the U.S. A miniature chest X-ray machine is in the offing so that every one will have a chest X-ray. Sputum examinations will be done right here by an Anguillan, now being trained as a technician. We already have medicineson hand. It is thus possible to wipe out tuberculosis in Anguilla. The talks were well received by a total of about 700 people. A question period closed each of Dr. Spector's talks. While a mass campaign is the ideal, the Public Health Section is actively skin-testing contacts of known cases, and the positive reactors are being X-rayed, with the X-ray plates being read by an X-ray specialist. Surprisingly less than ½ dozen active cases have been turned up so far, said Dr. Spector.

THE FRIENDS OF ANGUILLA:

We have just received some very encouraging news from Britain. We have had a letter from Lord Lambton M.P. telling us that a bodyof friends of Anguilla has just been formed in London, of which he is the Chairman. It is made up of members of both the House of Commons and the House of Lords, of all Political persuasions, as well as writers, Anguillans living in Britain and elsewhere, economists and others who are concerned with the affairs of the island. Its purpose is to assist the small and much-neglected island of Anguilla in its struggle for freedom, and to create for its people a wayof life self sufficiently and in freedom. It will publish from time to time a news letter containing matter of Anguillan interest, called the <u>Conch Shell</u> of which we have received the first copy, and also occasional research papers dealing with specific aspects of the island's political, economic, cultural and social life. 

CORRESPONDENCE.

Dear Sir, I heard with alarm over the BBC news, that Mr. Ronald Webster was intending to proclaim a unilateral declaration of independence, after the exexpiry of the Interim Period on Jan. 8th. I also heard that he was being advised on this course of action(according to the Z I Z bulletin)by Mr.Jeremiah Gumbs. I have always gathered that according to the provisional constitution of Anguilla, Mr. Webster is Chairman of the Council, elected by them to represent their views. If a decision to make a unilateral declaration of independence is the wish of the majority of the council, Mr. Webster would be justified in acting upon their wishes. I am not convinced that Mr. Webster is speaking for the whole council on this matter. We have a council composed of sensible men. Can it be that they advised this course of action? Bearing in mind that H.M.G.has strong ties with U.S.A.and the Caribbean islands, and her attitude towards us in the past, such a declaration of independence would, I presume, cut us off from all British Developement Aid in the future. It would deprive us of the security of having a British Representative on the island. It would immediately invalidate all our passports which are issued through the British Government, and make it impossible for us to obtain new passports. No doubt there are other unseen difficulties, but these are enough to warn us not to take such an ill-advised step now. We might be forced to take such a step later, but this is not the time. H.M.G. SHOULD ACT NOW (by A. Harrigan)

The attitude of H.M.G. of non-interferencein the internal matters of the"State" of St. Kitts Nevis and Anguilla, is understandable but regrettable as it has done nothing to solve our problems. The state of affairs has gone on too long: Anguilla's hands are tied, unable to accept outside investors though she has managed her own affairs successfully without outside assistance. Mr. Bradshaw has announced that he cannot get Anguilla back without outside assistance, thus admitting that he has failed to run the "State" according to its constitution. Anguilla has repeatedly shown her willingness to remain within the Commonwealth, so it is high time that H.M.G. did something about the situation. The presence of a British Representative on Anguilla is a good thing, it shows that H.M.G. realise that St.Kitts has lost control of Anguilla, and will never regain it; it also shows that Anguilla wants to retain her ties with Britain. We do not want to be compelled to take any action which would break those ties, and we appeal to H.M.G. not to allow this intolerable state of affairs to continue. Meanwhile at the close of the Interim Period, I beseech the Anguilla leaders to sit tight and WAIT. Give H.M.G. the last chance to make a move.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEP'T NOTICE.

The rainy season has increased the mosquito problem and the P.H.D. is active lytrying to control those in the swamps but we also need the cooperation of the people. The Aedes Aegypte mosquito (our enemy) could be eradicated if householders took special care of all water containers in which the mosquito breed. Remember in most cases you harbour 2 out of every 3 mosquitoes that bite you on your premises.

You can get rid of those dangerous insects if.

(1) You pour one table spoonful of Keresene in every water drum and six in every cistern-once per week.(2) or stock your cistern with mosquito eatting fish.(don't use kerosene in this case) (3) Make your cistern mosquito proof,(tight fitting covers, vents covered with wire gauge.) (4)Use sand instead of water in your flower vases. (5)Clean up your surroundings, fill up water holes and dump all artificial water containers.

YOU AND SPORTS - by Ralph V.C. Hodge "CRICKET" Our west Indians in Australia, Brisbane Dec. 6th,7th,8th and 10th. Pirst Test Won By WEST INDIANS (by 125 runs)

West Indies touring team blasted Australians into defeat in the first test match. First, the scores, W.I. 296 and 352. Australia 284 and 240. When W.I. took the crease they soon lost Camacho, who was bowled trying to sweep Gleason. Catew 83 and Kanhai 94, in a fine second wicket partnership played very sensibly until Carew was run out just after tea. Kanhai soon followed and the West Indies callapsed, being 267 for 9, when the day closed. On the second morning Gibbs and Hendricks added 29 before the West Indies innings closed at 296. Australia were soon in trouble loosing Redpath in Sobers' first over. Chappel joined Lawry and together they added 217, Chappel making 117 and Lawry 105, But Australia suffered a very disastrous callapse and at the close of play was 255 for 5.
